Congratulations on your decision to find out more about joining the Kansas Air National Guard and all the great benefits that come with it!

You may be a high school senior or a college student exploring the options for your future, or you may be a prior service member who misses the pride that comes from being among the best.

You may just be someone with no idea what their future plans are, it doesn't really matter where you're at, we may be able to help you.

We have assembled this packet to provide you with basic information about the Kansas Air Guard. You may have questions about the types of college financial benefits we offer, jobs we currently have avail-

able or maybe what Air Force Basic Military Training is like. We are here to help you with these topics and questions you may have about the enlistment process.

Seniors, you should know that you can start the qualification process at age 17, with parental consent, and actually enlist as a senior in high school. This allows you to work with us one weekend a month and get paid before you graduate.

When can an interested individual start the qualification process and enlist?

You can start the process between the ages of 17 and 35 years of age. Once you are qualified, having passed the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) and Physical, and have picked out a job, you can enlist. Once enlisted you will work with us one weekend a month (and get paid) until you attend Basic Training. Seniors in high school can start the qualification process if they are 17 and have their parental consent. For high school students, enlisting during your senior year helps you get Basic Training and Tech School dates that start shortly after graduation.

What commitment is expected from Air Guard members?

For new Air Guard members, the commitment involves working one weekend a month and a few weeks a year at a minimum for a period of 6 years. You must attend Basic Military Training (BMT) at Lackland AFB in Texas for 8 weeks, followed by Technical School for the career field you have chosen. Tech schools range in length from 6 to 52 weeks, depending on the job.

What type of jobs are available at the 184th?

Cyber warfare, Intelligence, Information Technology just to name a few! We also have jobs in ground radar systems, satellite wideband communications, network, switching and crypto systems. We have a wide variety of Civil Engineering positions to include: carpenters,

heating, ventilation, air conditioning, waste water utilities, electricians, power generator specialists, and heavy equipment operators. In addition to that, we also have Security Forces jobs (law enforcement).

Where will I work?

One of the primary benefits of joining the Air Guard is being part of your hometown Air Force. Ordinarily, you would join the unit closest to where you live, and after the initial training you would return to begin working one weekend a month and a few weeks a year from that location. On occasion, typically during the annual training periods (two to three weeks a year), units try to travel to varied locations to complete a more comprehensive training program. When this occurs, all of our members are provided transportation to and from that location as well as room and board.

The 184th Intelligence Wing is located on McConnell Air Force Base, Wichita Kansas with a detachment at Smoky Hill bombing range in Salina Kansas. All of our members are assigned to these two locations. The Air National Guard is unique this way, in that each base is responsible for hiring its own people. If you wanted to be a member of the Air Guard in another state you would have to speak with a representative from that state.

Is it true? Part time work, good pay and full time benefits?

Yes! Keep your regular full time job or college schedule. You will find a part-time job that can offer you a full time challenge plus excellent benefits and opportunities. Get paid for four days while working just two days a month.

For example, as of January 2008, working just one Drill Weekend per month, on a Saturday and Sunday, you can expect to earn between \$178 and \$210 to start, depending on your rank. It gets better from there as you progress in rank and time in service.

And there are other opportunities to make even more money. For example, you could earn up to \$2000 by referring the KSANG to your friends who might benefit from joining the Guard through the Guard Recruiting Assistance Program, or "G-RAP". G-RAP is a contracted program designed for individuals who voluntarily apply to become eligible to serve as a part time recruiter assistant.

The Kansas Tuition Assistance Program

The Kansas Tuition Assistance program offers tuition assistance for Kansas residents attending approved Kansas vocational schools, community colleges and four-year universities. The amount of the tuition assistance varies from semester to semester. The varying rate is based on the amount of money allocated by the state and the number of people who apply to use the program. Over the past couple years, we have paid between 80% and 90% of tuition costs for Guard members.

Additional assistance is provided by the Montgomery GI Bill administered by the



Veterans Administration, essentially a monthly allowance for individuals who are taking college classes. The amount of the benefit is pro-rated to the number of credit hours an individual is taking. Currently, full-time students (12 or more credits) receive \$329 / month *. You also may qualify for other benefits such as a \$20,000 * Non-Prior Service Enlist-

What other benefits may I be eligible for?

Base Exchange & Commissary

Privileges - Air Guard members are authorized unlimited use of the Base Exchange. The Base Exchange is like a combination between a discount store &

Air National Guard Financial Assistance Per Four-Month Semester

State Tuition Assistance Program: \$2763.20*

Tuition assistance is a varying amount each semester that is paid directly to the school to pay a student's tuition bill. The amount of benefit will vary depending on how much money was funded into the program by the state and how many guardsmen are participating in the program. This program works with over 60 four-year, two-year and vo-tech institutions in the State of Kansas. This benefit only applies to Kansas Residents. *Maximum payout of this program during Fall 2008 Semester.

Montgomery GI Bill: \$1316.00*

Cash allowance sent direct deposit to student each month while they are attending college classes. \$329 / month* during four-month semester. YOU MUST BE ATTENDING COLLEGE CLASSES TO RECEIVE THIS MONEY.

Montgomery GI Bill KICKER: \$1400.00*

Additional cash allowance paid for most Air Guard career fields. \$350/month during four-month semester. The KICKER works in conjunction with the GI Bill. Using the two benefits together will net a student \$679.00*/month. And just like the GI Bill... YOU MUST BE ATTENDING COLLEGE CLASSES TO RECEIVE THIS MONEY.

Drill Pay: \$840.00*

Guardsmen work 7:30AM to 4:00PM for one weekend (Saturday & Sunday) each month. Starting drill pay for most guardsmen is at the rank of Airman First Class (Enlisted Grade – 3) for \$210. Figuring four-month semester times \$210/month.

Ok, you have my attention. How do I enlist in the Guard?

There are several easy steps in the process to enlist with the Air National Guard. If you are interested in joining the Air Guard, having never served before, you must be between the ages of 17 and 34, pass a pre-screening interview, then participate in a written and physical exam to start. Qualified individuals will then go through a skill selection process, swear an Oath of Enlistment, attend a drill weekend, receive basic military training and attend tech school.

If you have previous military experience the process may be a little different. For example, prior service may be exempt from Basic and Tech school. Please ask your recruiter for details. New to the military? Here's what to expect:

1 The Interview -The process starts with an initial interview with an Air National Guard recruiter before you can actually join the Guard. The recruiter will pre-screen the individual by asking qualified questions. You can only have limited law violations and must pass a background check. If the individual meets pre-screen requirements, then the ASVAB exam and physical can be scheduled.

2 The ASVAB Exam - Is a written exam given to everyone who enters any branch of the military. The Air National Guard uses your scores to determine your abilities in the following areas: Mechanical, Administration, General Knowledge, and Electronics. This is usually done in conjunction with your physical and will mean an overnight stay in Kansas City at no expense to you.

3 The Physical - All applicants must take a military physical examination at the Military Entrance Processing Station (MEPS) in Kansas City to ensure you qualify for military duty. During the physical you will be asked to provide your complete medical history. This is usually done in conjunction with your ASVAB and will mean an overnight stay in Kansas City at no expense to you.

4. The Skill Selection Process - Once you complete and pass the pre-

screening process and are determined eligible to join, your recruiter uses your preferences, ASVAB scores and physical profile to help compile a list of jobs that are vacant AND that you qualify for. With this list you will choose the top 2 career fields that interest you. We then set up an interview with the section supervisor(s) of the careers you picked, who will show you around the shop and explain the job in detail. This is your opportunity to ask questions about the jobs you are interested in, get to know the people and the surroundings.

Once a job is selected, you will be scheduled to enlist. Congratulations! This is the point where your membership in the Air Guard begins. Note that everything prior to swearing in is just preliminary processing and does not obligate you to join.

5 The Oath of Enlistment - Once the applicant has picked out a job then a recruiter will complete the applicant's enlistment packet. This includes asking the applicant to provide items such as a driver's license, birth certificate, social


security card, high school diploma or GED, security clearance worksheet, parental consent form, etc. On enlistment day you are welcome to invite family and friends to witness you being sworn into duty by one of our officers. This is the final step in becoming a member of the Air National Guard.

After swearing the Oath of Enlistment, what happens then?

You will attend Guard Drill Weekend, Basic Military Training and Tech School. Upon enlistment you will start attending Guard Drill Weekends. Your Basic Training and Tech School dates will be requested from the Air Force. Typically you will go to Basic Training within a few months of enlisting and tech school following. Some exceptions are made because of scheduling conflicts with the Air Force schools.

About Basic Training and Tech School

Basic Military Training (BMT)

BMT is your initial training with the Air National Guard. We use the same Basic Training as the Air Force. BMT is approximately 8 ½ weeks. During this time, you will learn discipline, teamwork and the ability to pay attention to detail. You will be issued uniforms and learn how to properly wear them. You will spend time in the classroom learning about the history of the Air Force, Customs and Courtesies and the Uniform Code of Military Justice.


The training also includes physical fitness requirements. You will run and do calisthenics on a daily basis. You will go on a simulated deployment to a tent city where you will shoot the M-16 rifle, accomplish an obstacle course, and learn about chemical warfare and how to properly wear a chemical warfare suit. Throughout BMT you will also learn to march and practice drill and ceremony for your graduation parade.

The Tech School

Tech School classes are conducted in a college-type atmosphere. You will stay in a dorm with a roommate or two. You will attend classes for the number of weeks required by your job selection.

Tech School lengths vary from 5 to 52+ weeks. You will be tested on the material you have learned and upon completion, you will graduate and return to McConnell Air Force Base in Wichita, Kansas.

AEROSPACE CONTROL AND WARNING SYSTEMS – 1C5X1

MANDATORY ASVAB SCORE: General Score – 55

Identifies, maintains surveillance, and assists in controlling aerospace objects. Operates aerospace control and warning systems equipment, and simulation equipment. Interprets and reacts to radarscope presentation and to generated console displays. Compares and reports track positions based on flight data or data base files. Assists in weapons control and performs surveillance, data link, identification, and data management functions in aerospace systems. Tears down, loads, unloads, and erects equipment and components. Performs as crew member of operational unit in functions of air weapons control. Responsible for safety of flight for air operations being controlled.

Class length: 4.5 weeks Location: Keesler AFB, MS

AEROSPACE MEDICAL SERVICE – 4N0X1

MANDATORY: General Score – 44

Plans, provides, and evaluates routine patient care and treatment of beneficiaries to include flying and special operational duty personnel. Organizes the medical environment, performs and directs support activities in patient care situations, including contingency operations and disasters. Performs duty as Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN) independent duty medical technician (IDMT), aeromedical evacuation technician (AET), or hyperbaric medical technician (HBMT), allergy and immunization technician (AIT), or neurology technician (NT) functions.

OTHER MANDATORY REQUIREMENTS: Normal color vision. Must be a US citizen Physical Profile: 222221 Class length: 16 weeks Location: Sheppard AFB, TX (Subject to change)





COMMUNICATIONS COMPUTER SYSTEMS CONTROL 3C2X1

MANDATORY: Electronic Score – 70

Monitors and controls C-CS performance. Operates processor assisted diagnostic and control equipment and software to perform network, technical, and configuration control, surveillance, and security. Monitors status and performance of transmission and switching systems, local and wide area networks, and subscriber equipment. Operates test equipment to verify end-to-end circuit system, and network signals meet minimum standards. Operates network management hardware and software to ensure compliance with security standards and service levels. Configures circuits, systems, and networks based on standards, traffic patterns, and results of quality assurance tests. Performs circuit, system, and network patching and cross connecting to establish, sustain, and restore service. Localizes failures, performs operational adjustments, and re-configures circuit, system, and network equipment. Fabricates copper and fiber optics cable assemblies. Operates cryptographic equipment to test, reset, and re-key.

COMMUNICATIONS -COMPUTER SYSTEMS OPERATIONS - 3COX1

MANDATORY: General Score – 64

Performs daily network management, control, and administration of information flow in Network Management (NM), Help Desk (HD), Information Protection Operations (IPO), and Network Administration (NA). Oversees network configuration, faults, performances, and security management through HD, IPO, and NA functions. Reviews and plans networks, controls distribution of Internet Protocol (IP) address space, and enforces Internet use policy. Implements Air Force Computer Emergency



MANDATORY ASVAB SCORE: Electronic Score – 70

Plans, organizes and directs sustainment activities. Establishes work standards, methods and controls for preventative, scheduled, and unscheduled maintenance actions. Determines extent and economy of repair of malfunctioning equipment. Ensures compliance with technical data, instructions, and work standards. Interprets malfunctions and prescribes corrective action. Serves on, or directs inspection teams organized to evaluate base or command sustainment programs. Manages, or performs



Response Team and Automated Systems Security Incident Support Team security fixes, operating system patches, and antivirus software. Develops local restoral and contingency operations plans. Processes and reviews C4 systems requirement documentation, telecommunications service requests, status of acquisition messages, and telecommunications service orders. Checks equipment for serviceability. Positions equipment such as gasoline, and diesel engines; generators; switchgears; air compressors; and other power generating auxiliary equipment. Installs, positions, rewinds, and pretensions aircraft arresting systems. Certifies aircraft arresting systems as required. Checks installed equipment to ensure compliance with publications, policies, and directives. Inspects, tests, and services component systems such as safety, fuel, lubrication, cooling, air pressure, pumps, regulators, governors, and accessory equipment. Observes and interprets instruments such as ammeters, voltmeters, frequency meters, synchroscopes, automatic temperature and pressure recorders, and engine oil, fuel, and coolant gauges. Adjusts engine generator systems to maintain proper voltage, current frequency, and synchronization. Synchronizes multi-generators. Operates high and low voltage switches, circuit breakers, rheostats, and other controls on switch- gear and distribution panels. Performs electrical power control and distribution functions.

MANDATORY: Mechanical Score – 35

Installs, maintains, and repairs interior, exterior, overhead, underground electrical power distribution systems and components such as capacitor banks, vacuum and air break switches, breakers, transformers, fuses, lighting fixtures, receptacles, and motors. Climbs utility poles and operates special purpose vehicles and equipment, including line maintenance and high



MANDATORY ASVAB SCORE: Electronic Score – 70

Installs, maintains, and repairs fixed or mobile air traffic control, weather, ground aircraft control and warning radar systems, related radar operator training devices, aircraft identification equipment, remoting systems, video mappers, computerized processors, and communications subsystems. Installs, connects, troubleshoots, and maintains HVAC/R controls. Tests HVAC/R equipment for proper operation. Balances air and water in HVAC systems. Monitors systems operation to ensure efficiency and compliance technical orders, manufacturer handbooks, local procedures, codes, and directives. Evaluates water treatment for heating and cooling systems. Ensures compliance with safety and environmental regulations for fuels, refrigerants, and hazardous materials.

Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve (ESGR) is a Department of Defense organization. ESGR has a national network of over 900 volunteer ombudsmen who help resolve issues between employers and their employees who serve in the National Guard and Reserve. These volunteers, each of whom receives extensive training on USERRA and dispute resolution techniques, serve as informal mediators between the employer and employee and inform and educate the employer and employee on what the law requires and assist in finding a mutually agreeable solution.

A Uniformed Service Member has rights under the Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Rights Act (USERRA), Title 38, Chapter 43, United States Code.

Your Rights include:

- Military leave of absence (up to five years of voluntary service)
- Prompt reinstatement back into your job
- Accumulation of seniority and pension plan benefits
- Reinstatement of health insurance, regardless of pre-existing conditions

- Training or retraining of job skills, including accommodations for disabled
- Protection against discrimination

Your Responsibilities Include:

- Before Reporting for Duty: Provide prior notice to employer (preferably in writing)
- While Performing Duty: Serve under honorable conditions
- After Release from Duty: Return to work in a timely manner

Reemployment Timetable:

- Less than 31 days of service Report next work day after safe travel home and 8 hours of rest
- 31-180 days of service Apply for reinstatement within 14 days of release from active duty
- Over 180 days of service Apply for reinstatement within 90 days of release from active duty

How to Resolve an Employment Issue:

- Inform your unit/military chain of command

- If not resolved, contact the Department of Labor (1-866-4-usa-dol or www.dol.gov/vets)
- You may consult a private attorney, however at your own expense, which precludes ESGR assistance
